Parish Precept

Following the recent council tax bill, where it shows a significant increase in the parish precept, we wanted to explain why we felt it necessary to raise it by this amount.

When the current council started, we inherited a situation where the precept had kept pace with rising costs up to a point. However, we have faced the following challenges:

- 1. **Clerks salary** we have had to increase both our hourly rate and the number of hours we pay an individual doing the role of parish clerk and responsible financial officer.
- 2. **Playground maintenance** we have had to budget a significant amount for this, owing to the age of the equipment. This includes yearly safety inspections, as well as the replacement of damaged wood, fixtures and fastenings.
- 3. **Pavilion maintenance** a quote for longer term roof repairs was received in 2019, amounting to around £12,000. However, the surplus from the yearly precept has not enabled us to set aside any significant money for this and what we had set aside previously had to be used to handle roof leaks and to do an inspection of the current state of the roof in summer 2024.
- 4. **Grounds maintenance** increased cuts, extra verge cutting costs, etc. and no increase from OCC to cover the work which they used to handle, has meant that in some cases, costs have doubled from last year.
- 5. **Contingency fund** we have been instructed by Oxfordshire Association of Local Councillors (OALC) that we should be holding a contingency fund; sufficient to cover unforeseen expenses. This is usually equivalent to a year's precept.

We review budget versus actual spend on a monthly basis and, of course, are audited on a yearly basis. Should you have any questions regarding how we use the parish precept, reports are posted on our website and/or you can raise the matter with any of the parish councillors.

Move to Unitary Council Authority – Ridgeway Council

Following the government's proposals to replace the existing two-tier council system in areas like Oxfordshire, it has been proposed that our area moves to a new unitary council called 'Ridgeway Council'. This would cover the districts of West Berkshire, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse and is expected to take place some time within the next 3 - 5 years.

The three districts share strong demographic and economic similarities and significant historic ties. This is symbolised by the working title of 'Ridgeway Council', named after the famous 5,000-year-old footpath that travels through the heart of our councils. By building on these shared connections, the combined councils believe Ridgeway Council will provide a strong and effective foundation for the future. In particular, it should enhance financial sustainability, promote economic growth, and support future housing and infrastructure needs. At the same time, it is seen as maintaining and enhancing the unique character of our market towns and rural areas – a key driver for our local economies.

Could you be their next victim?

Whilst many crimes are falling (such as burglary, down by a third since before the pandemic), sadly we are all more at risk online. We can all feel the benefits of living our lives in a more connected way, but with the convenience that technology brings, there are also risks. But a huge amount of cyber crime and fraud is preventable.

Scams can take place online, on the phone or in person. Here are some of the ways fraudsters may try and target you, and the signs to spot to help you protect yourself:

MAIL SCAMS Common types of postal scams include fake lotteries and prize draws, offers of investments and inheritance windfalls. What to look out for: irresistible offers that are too good to be true; unfamiliar branding; not using your name; bad spelling and grammar.

TELEPHONE SCAMS Common telephone scams include investments, pension or computer support scams. The person calling often sounds professional and may pretend to be from a trusted organisation such as your bank, the police or a company you recognise. What to look out for: callers asking you to share personal or financial information or a passcode or pin; callers asking for remote access to your computer; callers trying to rush or pressure you into making decisions.

DOORSTEP SCAMS Criminals pose as legitimate business people selling goods or services that are faulty, overpriced, poor quality or non-existent. What to look out for: being asked for money upfront before providing any goods or service; No ID or proof of who they are; telling you they're doing work for neighbours to try and gain your trust.

EMAIL, TEXT AND WEBSITE SCAMS In what is known as Phishing, an email or text may appear to be from your bank or other company in order to trick you into revealing personal details. You may be asked to click on a link which takes you to a fake website where you will be prompted to enter your details. What to look out for: spelling or grammar mistakes in emails or texts; they may not use your name; an unusual email address which may be similar but doesn't match the company email; strong encouragement to click on a link.

Remember, anyone can be a scam victim.

If you spot a scam, always report it. You can also look out for other people who may be vulnerable to scams by joining <u>friendsagainstscams.org.uk</u> to help raise awareness throughout your community. For more information visit <u>stopthinkfraud.campaign.gov.uk</u>.

Dear All,

In CS Lewis's The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, the lion Aslan is put to death by the White Witch. The stone table on which He is killed cracks in two, but Aslan meets with Lucy and Susan alive again. He explains the Witch's failure:

'her knowledge goes back only to the dawn of time. But if she could have looked a little further back, she would have known that when a willing victim who had committed no treachery was killed in a traitor's stead, the Table would crack, and Death itself would start working backwards.'

This is a great picture of what Jesus' cross and His resurrection has achieved. As Paul writes, 'I want to know Christ, to know the power of His resurrection' (Philippians 3:10). To understand the real Easter, we should experience the same power that raised Jesus from the dead!

New Hope: Like the girls in the story, Easter highlights the sadness and confusion that loss brings. Yet the resurrection of Jesus brings new hope, as it demonstrates the victory secured by the cross over sin, Satan and death. We can face life's difficulties knowing that Jesus walks beside us.

New Love: Our relationships are often characterised by a lack of forgiveness, hurt and betrayal. Yet Jesus' resurrection opens the possibility of new love, as His power enables us to accept others and forgive them.

New Life: When we are trying to make sense of life, like the girls in the story, Jesus offers us a living relationship with Himself. It's a friendship with God through Jesus that can begin today and continue for eternity.

When Lucy met Aslan again, she cried: 'Oh, you're real, you're real!' We too can find the real Easter through a life changing encounter with the living Christ.

Cholsey Repair Café


Yet another repair session is on offer at Cholsey Repair Café, which takes place on Saturday, 17th May at The Cholsey Pavilion.






