Update on Oxfordshire County Council's 20mph initiative

As mentioned in last month's Moulsford News, OCC are rolling out a 20mph initiative across the county as part of their traffic policy. The feedback from people who completed the survey was that:

- 1. You would prefer the speed limit to remain at 30mph rather than change to 20mph.
- 2. The budget saved from not moving to 20mph should be used to improve signage, etc.

However, on further investigation it is not that simple. The two initiatives would be entirely separate. Should we choose not to move to 20mph, any funds "saved" would be diverted to other villages who are making this change. That is, the funds are not available to improve current road conditions in Moulsford.

In addition, since we conducted the original 20mph survey, we have received a revised plan from OCC of where 20mph could be implemented – see map on next page. This is less extensive than the original plan, though the council understands this may still be unacceptable to many. The revised plan does, however, address concerns raised over the last 12-18 months to the Parish Council regarding reducing speed at the Underhill junction, slowing traffic speed in Underhill and Glebe Close, and making it less intimidating for walkers along the A329.

Alternative traffic calming measures

I have enquired whether there are funds available in 2024-25 financial year from OCC Highways, aside from the 20mph budget. This would be for repainting the speed signs on the road, potentially installing the smiley face speed cameras, etc. However this separate Highways budget, plus the resources to do the work, is already assigned for the current financial year.. The earliest we could therefore do any work on improving highway conditions is 2025-26. It is likely we would need to raise at least part of the funds for this ourselves.

Approximate costs for highways improvements are as follows:

- Another permanent speed sign for the north of the village, like we have to the south of the village near Cow Lane, would be around £4,500-5,000 (includes a solar panel)
- A SID (the smiley face like they have at the big Crowmarsh roundabout) is typically around £2000 £2500 with a 1 year guarantee. However, for a SID, the village has to unbox, install and set the unit up, plus we need several poles set up for this at a rate of between £700 and £1500 per pole, so we are looking at around £6,000-£8,000.
- Chicanes and other more permanent changes are in the ball park £18-32,000. Bear in mind that traffic changes such as these also require a public consultation with surrounding villages around another £3,000.

OCC Highways have provisionally pencilled us in for work in 2025-26 but are unable to commit to funding part or all of this work yet.

Working Highways Group

Given the complexity and cost of potential Highway changes, as a council we need to be sure the decisions we make reflect the views of all the villagers, both now and in the longer term.

For this reason, given the views on both the council and in the village are split, we are looking for volunteers from the village, from both sides of the argument, to participate in a working Highways group and help us determine the next steps forward – both for 20mph and for general highway improvements. Ideally we would be looking for around 6 people and their involvement would probably be for around 6-8 months.

Please contact Hilary Shaw or the Parish Clerk if you feel you can give up a few hours to help with this.

Note:

If we did decide to progress investigating implementing 20mph in Moulsford, we are not irrevocably committed until the final plans are done (likely to be late summer/early autumn). We can halt the project at any time if we feel it does not meet our needs; lessening the risk in exploring this option.

From the Vicar Rebecca Peters

Dear Friends,

Last month we gave thanks for the life of Breyan Knowles and we continue to pray for his friends and family that they might know the Lord's comfort and peace at this time. Church music and hymns were among Breyan's many passions and I thought I would reflect on a hymn this month.

Praise my soul the King of heaven, Fatherlike, He tends and spares us;

To His feet thy tribute bring; Well our feeble frame He knows;

Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven,

In His hands He gently bears us,

Evermore his praises sing. Rescues us from all our foes.

Alleluia! Alleluia! Praise the everlasting King.

Alleluia! Alleluia! Widely yet His mercy flows.

Praise Him for His grace and favour

Angels in the height, adore Him,

To our fathers in distress; Ye behold Him face to face;

Praise Him, still the same as ever, Sun and moon bow down before Him,

Slow to chide and swift to bless. Dwellers all in time and space;

Alleluia! Alleluia! Glorious in His faithfulness. Praise Him! Praise him!

Praise with us the God of grace!

By Henry Francis Lyte (1793-1847)

This stately poetic paraphrase of Psalm 103 has been included in probably more solemn ceremonies than any other hymn in the English language. It was even chosen by Queen Elizabeth for her wedding to the Duke of Edinburgh in 1947.

Henry Lyte had been a brilliant theological student at university in Dublin, with a gift for versifying. After graduation he moved to a tiny and remote parish in County Wexford to serve his curacy. It was here, when he was about 25, that Henry had a religious experience which would transform his life.

A close friend of his, another clergyman, had fallen ill, and was clearly dying. Henry went to visit him. The friend was not as distressed as Henry had imagined he would be. Instead, the friend confessed that he had been rereading the New Testament, with an eye on eternity, and had made a great discovery.

There was no need to rely on religious duties and formalities and good deeds to gain peace with God. Instead, we can trust completely in the mercy of Christ and His saving power.

Henry was sophisticated and had been very formal in his ministry. But this encounter with his friend's faith at death's very door, made him reconsider his faith. He wrote later that his dear friend 'who died happy in the thought that there was One who would atone for his delinquencies' made him 'study my Bible and preach in another manner than I had previously done'. And soon after this hymn appeared, in 1834. Lyte rejoices in the majesty and wonder of the living God, who in turn loves us. He captures the measure of the Psalm in enduring lyrics, which combine time, eternity, God and man all swept up into one embrace.

This season of the year we rejoice in creation and celebrate Pentecost this month, all are welcome to join us in celebrating Sunday morning services 9:00am.



The Old Vicarage - A brief history

"The Old Vicarage" in Moulsford was acquired in 1928 by The Friends of the Elderly (FOE), a registered charity, to become a Care Home. The FOE also owns and funds two other Care Homes in this area.

The Old Vicarage had previously been owned by the Church of England Diocese of Oxford but was sold after the merger of local church parishes had resulted in the Parish of Moulsford no longer having a resident Vicar.

One of the proponents for the acquisition of the Old Vicarage by the FOE was Captain Leopold Lonsdale RN, a local resident. He had tried but failed to find a retirement home in this area for a close friend. He decided instead, with the help of local friends, to fund the building of a retirement home himself, to be owned by the FOE. The house was thus to be a gift to the people of this area as a retirement home for those in need. When Captain Lonsdale learned that the Old Vicarage, by then a privately owned house, was for sale he bought it together with several acres of land, and commissioned architects to design a purpose built home for thirty residents.

The old building was demolished and the new building completed in 1998. A plaque in the hallway records: "This stone was laid in April 1998 by Sir John Milne, Chairman of The Friends of the Elderly, to commemorate the rebuilding of The Old Vicarage.

An earlier Vicarage, built in the 19th century near the church and still standing, is now a private house.

Wallingford Accessible Boat Club launches its Community Champion Scheme

And the first WABC Community Champion is local resident Abi who is running in support of the Club in the London Marathon!

Wallingford Accessible Boat Club (WABC), the local charity which enables disabled and generally immobile people to get out and about on the River Thames, has launched its Community Champions Scheme. The Scheme aims to encourage people and organisations in the local community to raise much needed funds to help this popular Club meet its running costs.

And, the first WABC Community Champion is local resident Abi Turner, a member of Benson Striders Running Club, who was selected to take up The Striders entry in this year's London Marathon (Sunday 21st April) and Abi chose WABC to be the beneficiary of her sponsorship funds.

WABC Chairman, John Jenkins MBE, explained: "We are a small organisation that needs to raise £15,000 or so each year to operate and with limited resources it's a tough ask. The Community Champions Scheme aims to encourage people and organisations in the district to raise funds for us by undertaking a challenge, a fundraiser of some kind, to raise funds for WABC. The event could be anything – a marathon knitting session, a coffee morning, a stint in the garden, a marathon karaoke session, or whatever – large or small. We will be pleased to help in any way we can - with promotional material, a sponsorship site and general advice or whatever is needed."

Jenkins continued: "And we are delighted that Abi has taken up the formidable challenge of the London Marathon on 21st April – you can't do a much bigger challenge than that! She is an absolute wonder and we are so pleased that she will become our very first Community Champion. We encourage anyone out there to support her and contribute to her fundraising page www.wabc.org.uk/abismarathonrun - the support really does make a difference."

Abi, who does most of her training with Benson Striders, has already completed a 24 miler as part of her training regime which is on course to peak for the big race.

A very upbeat Abi commented: "Benson striders have fulfilled a lifelong ambition of mine, by granting me the opportunity to take part in such a prestigious race. However, raising money for WABC, a local charity that offers so much for so many, has given me the impetus and determination to complete the 26.2miles."


