#### **Evolution of Moulsford Recreation Ground**

Over the last few months, you may have noticed various changes to our recreation ground.

Moulsford Parish Council made a decision earlier this year that we wanted to increase the biodiversity of the recreation area, as well as helping promote wildlife corridors. This was to progress the work that has already been done in recent years to make our green spaces more nature friendly. It also fulfils our statutory duty to develop policies and take action to conserve and enhance biodiversity.

A map of the recreation ground as we wanted it to look was reviewed in February 2024 at the monthly council meeting, and after considering the feedback received at this meeting, a decision made to go ahead.

Accordingly, the individuals who support the maintenance of the recreation ground (the mowers, strimmers, tree surgeons, volunteers) were instructed how to proceed, and we are continuing to evolve our mowing and strimming regime to support the long grass scheme and to adjust for optimal efficiency and effectiveness.

Introducing more areas of uncut grass is not only increasingly seen as an attractive feature of a landscape design, it also provides many benefits for nature - as well as enabling wild flowers to grow, the long grass areas increase habitat and food sources for insects, birds, amphibians and mammals. Even the interface between long grass and short grass is a specific habitat in itself, so now that we are mowing with curved perimeters, we are creating more habitat for nature than mowing in straight lines.

The very wet spring presented a few challenges with managing the turbo charged grass and weed growth, and

along with most parks and green spaces across the country, the recreation ground looked a bit like a jungle for a week or two before the late May cut. And the excessive rain combined with unseasonal cool nights has impacted on wildflower meadows which needed warmer nights for germination to take place - so some flowering has been delayed, or prevented altogether. However, on the plus side, very excitingly we now have cowslips and orchids, amongst other rare wildflowers now emerging in the long grass areas.

Meanwhile the wildlife corridors have also been developing. Wildlife corridors are areas of undisturbed planting which link wildlife habitats such as fields and woods together, and provide a natural path for insects, hedgehogs, rabbits, and other wildlife, to safely move from one habitat to another. On the recreation ground, these run along the sides of the recreation ground and form a link between Badgers Bank, Cranford hockey field, and Twinks's horse field and on, down the recreation ground towards the river. Wildlife corridors typically help alleviate the fragmentation formed by human intervention, such as buildings and roads.

Towards the end of May, a subset of the council carried out a detailed review of progress and it was agreed that:

- Areas around play equipment and seating must be kept clear of vegetation for safety reasons
- A narrow border along the edge of the green where it abuts the fencing to properties would be mown or strimmed regularly, to reduce the potential spread of weeds into neighbouring properties
- The area alongside the road and intended for spring bulbs would be mown shorter than on the original plan, presenting a neater profile to the road and making it easier to plant up later

The council have also had discussions with some of the individuals in the properties bordering the recreation ground, about how they view the planting. The response has been positive and the residents happy for things to evolve. We are also very grateful to all those who have been so generously giving their time in helping to develop and maintain these important biodiversity enhancements.

As we endeavour to strike a balance between improving biodiversity on the one hand, and the challenges of 'weed' control on the other, we appreciate the helpful feedback, and any practical help we are receiving from villagers. For instance, some concerns have been raised about patches of thistle in the 'wild' areas bordering some of the perimeters of the recreation ground. Acting on the advice we've been given by nature experts in the village - that thistles are a vital source of nectar for pollinators - we're trying to provide more wildlife benefits by letting the thistles flower, and then some kind volunteers will cut the thistles down before they begin to seed.

Going forward, we will continue to monitor the development on the recreation ground and try to adjust as necessary to cater for the needs of both villagers and wildlife. If you are someone with wildlife and habitat expertise and/or gardening expertise, who might be willing to join a team of people we can consult when we are navigating some of these decisions, we would love to hear from you. We would also like to invite any villagers interested in getting involved in how the recreation ground evolves to speak to Melanie Mousley Jones; we would welcome your input.

#### Traffic calming measures and 20mph update

Traffic calming and improving road safety through the village has consistently been identified as a priority concern for villagers.

The introduction of a 20mph zone (for a short section in the centre of the village, including side roads) is a fully funded option currently being offered to Moulsford by Oxfordshire County Council (OCC). This offer, which is time limited (on a strictly use it or lose it basis), provides the village with an opportunity to trial a 20mph zone, which would be in place by March 2025 latest, and can be reversed at no cost if we subsequently decide we no longer want it. A 20mph zone could support any other traffic calming measures we decide to adopt. Everything other than 20mph will require fundraising and cannot be implemented until later in 2025/26.

Villagers' responses to the survey last year showed a 42% pro/54% con (4% undecided) split against 20mph, but that was before it became clear that this is the only guaranteed funded traffic calming option available in the near term. We have until October 2024 to withdraw from OCC's 20mph scheme, and want input from as many villagers as possible to help inform our final decision on this.

It is important to note that once we withdraw from the 20mph opportunity, we will lose the funding, and would have to fundraise for 20mph if we subsequently change our minds. The current funding for 20mph cannot be used for any other purpose.

Please tell us\* what you would choose from these options:

- Implement 20mph speed limit to short section (between Ferry Lane and Cranford School, including side roads). Free to Moulsford (operational by March 2025)
- Fundraise for interactive smiley face speed signs. Wait for OCC to allocate labour resources for implementation (operational 2025/26 or later)
- Apply for OCC to fund electronic speed signs wait for application outcome. Once funding agreed, wait for OCC to allocate labour resources for implementation (operational 2025/26 or later)
- Fundraise for 'gates' or other structure/road signs (e.g. "Please drive carefully") to mark entry to Moulsford at either end of village. Wait for OCC to allocate labour resources for implementation (operational 2025/26 or later)
- Fundraise for any other traffic calming measures (not listed above). Wait for OCC to allocate labour resources for implementation (operational 2025/26 or later)

#### From Your Parish Council continued

#### **Keeping Moulsford Looking Beautiful!**

The separate article in Moulsford News explains what we are doing as a council to manage the recreation ground, for which we are directly responsible.

However we have also had concerns raised to us regarding the state of the verges bordering the A329. These are the responsibility of OCC, who fund one cut per year. Further cuts are done at village expense, therefore we have to time them carefully.

The next cut is due early/mid July. Since this only covers part of the village, we would also ask for the help of householders fronting the A329 to please:

- Cut the grass verges in front of your house on a regular basis
- Remove overhanding branches from your garden that may be impeding pedestrians
- Cut back any hedges that are beginning to block paths, and
- Ensure any speed signs near you are kept clear of foliage and are easily visible from the road at all times.

Some of you already do this but its easy to overlook (I tend to forget about this when doing regular lawn cuts!). However, it makes a big difference to how tidy the village looks.

Going forward as the budget for maintenance and strimming remains constrained, it would be useful if we could have a working group similar to the litter picking one. That is, a couple of times of year, people could help cut things back where appropriate and keep Moulsford looking its best. #### Remembering the faith of Eric Liddell - 100 years ago at the Paris Olympics

The 2024 Paris Olympics (26 July – 11 August) will soon be here. It was 100 years ago this summer, also at the Paris Olympics, that a young science student at Edinburgh University, Eric Liddell, ran an astonishing race that caught the imagination of millions worldwide.

Liddell had been born in China in 1902, to Scottish missionaries there. Early on, he had made a deep commitment to Jesus Christ, and sensed he was being called to spend his life in serving others. But Liddell was also an outstanding sportsman, playing rugby for Scotland before settling on athletics.

When he was chosen for the Paris Olympics, he expected to run his preferred 100m. But then came the news that the race would be run on a Sunday, and Liddell refused. Quickly, he trained for the 200m and 400m. He took bronze at the 200m, but no one expected much from him at the 400m. Instead, he won, and even broke the world record in the process.

After the Olympics, Liddell felt God calling him to his life's work. He went back to China, to teach in a Christian college. As the Second World War loomed, he sent his wife and children home, but stayed on himself. By 1943 Liddell was confined to a brutal prison camp, where he shone among the fellow prisoners — encouraging them, teaching Bible classes, and praying for both his fellow inmates and the prison wardens. Deeply malnourished, his health failed and in 1945, just months before the war ended, he died, aged only 43. In 1981 his story was made into the Oscar-winning film *Chariots of Fire*.

Liddell's life was a demonstration of faithfulness, self-sacrifice, loyalty and Godly character. He chose to put his faith in God as the priority for the way he lived his life. My prayer is that many more people would know the joy of a life lived in relationship with Jesus.

If you would like to explore the Christian faith for yourself, do get in contact with me, or you are very welcome to start coming to church (St John the Baptist Moulsford, 9am services) and explore the Bible, prayer and worship for yourself.



If we get sufficient numbers we would look to hire the pavilion where there are already easels etc. - but would have to protect the floor of course!



#### Wallingford Accessible Boat Club announce wheelyboat service 5 days per week

#### More choice for passengers, increased capacity for additional voyages!

Wallingford Accessible Boat Club (WABC), the local charity which enables disabled and less mobile people to get out and about on the River Thames, today announced that they are now offering a five day a week, Tuesday to Saturday service. This important announcement gives passengers greater freedom of choice when considering the timing of their voyage as well as increasing the total number of voyages on offer.

WABC Chairman, John Jenkins MBE, explained: "We are so very pleased to be able to offer additional capacity to our clients so they can take full advantage of our free-of-charge river voyages. We had an excellent response to our recruitment campaign over last winter and having got our new recruits fully trained we have been able to add them into our pool of volunteer crews. So, big thanks to them!"

Jenkins continued: "With the increased capacity, we can offer 9 voyages per week and hope to now be able to make up the time lost due to adverse river and weather conditions in April and May. We set a target at the start of the year of 300 passengers voyaging with us during the season to September so now we should be back on track. So, I appeal to all disabled and less mobile people in South Oxfordshire to take full advantage of our service – come and have some fun on the river! 


