### Our responsibilities online

Social media and the increased use of technology in our everyday lives have brought benefits that would have been unimaginable just a few generations ago, yet we all know that there are drawbacks. A lot of the debate about social media can leave us feeling rather powerless. It's all about big tech giants and the need for governments to impose regulations and restrictions, but the reality is that social media only serves to amplify the trends that already exist in society - both good and bad.

We can all have a role to play, whether it is about keeping ourselves and our loved ones safe, or being conscious of what we are sharing ourselves.

There is a lot of useful information available for parents in particular - a good place to start is <u>internetmatters.org</u>, which provides practical advice for parents and teachers. What's always worth remembering is that in many ways the risks that exist today have always existed, they have just taken on a different form. The speed of social media and the fact that it brings the outside world into our most private spaces presents some new challenges, but the underlying issues remain the same.

Increasingly, parents will be aware of the risk of online grooming, but few people realise the largest proportion of indecent images are shared by children with other children - often to those they consider themselves to be in a relationship with, and these images may then be shared on to other people. Our children need to learn, not just how to be safe from strangers, but the importance of normal, healthy relationships, and how to treat each other offline as well.

Parents are key to this. Of course all children are different, with varying levels of maturity and differing needs. There is an understandable worry of children being left behind if they don't have access to the latest tech. These can be difficult decisions but if we as parents cannot withstand the inevitable "peer pressure" then why would we expect our children not to follow the same path.

Keeping children safe online often makes us think about the darker, more sinister side of social media; but we should also think about how we engage with the more benign side of social media. The old adage, never say anything online you wouldn't say to someone's face, remains very true. Often the separation provided by a screen can make us forget that we are talking to, or about, real people - whether that's celebrities or someone in our own village.

Social media is great, I use it a lot, but we know it has it's downsides. There are things that big companies can do to protect children in particular, but it's unfashionable these days to talk about our own responsibility. We can all play our part in making our online and offline world a little better.







### **WABC Makes Waves With New Riverside Home**

#### **Bookings Now Open for the 2025 Season**

After eight years of searching, Wallingford Accessible Boat Club (WABC) has finally dropped anchor in the heart of town! The volunteer-led charity officially opened its permanent base at Riverside, Wallingford last Thursday—and the new season launches on 26th May with bookings now open.

The grand opening was a proud moment for WABC, marked by a ribbon-cutting ceremony led by Club Chairman John Jenkins MBE, joined by Cllr Sam James-Lawrie, South Oxfordshire's Lead for the Environment. Distinguished guests included two Deputy Lieutenants of Oxfordshire, the new Mayor of Wallingford Cllr Ros Lester, the High Steward Mr Ken Lester, and representatives from South Oxfordshire District Council.

The new accessible pontoon—specially designed for WABC's custom-built Wheelyboat, WOW-one—was officially declared open, creating a new gateway to the Thames for elderly and disabled passengers.

John Jenkins MBE called the moment "a dream come true."

"After years operating from temporary facilities in Benson, we finally have a home in central Wallingford. We're so grateful to SODC and all our incredible supporters—this wouldn't have been possible without them."

With better visibility, improved facilities, and direct access to one of the most beautiful stretches of the Upper Thames, WABC expects to increase passenger numbers from 405 to over 500 this season.

"We're here for the long haul," added Jenkins. "We believe our unique wheelyboat service will become a vital part of promoting Wallingford as the incredible river town it is."

### Work to create accessible moorings on the River Thames at Wallingford is now complete

Over £209,000 has been invested in major accessibility improvements at the riverside in Wallingford.

The project has been managed by South Oxfordshire District Council, with the support and eager anticipation of the local volunteer-run charity, Wallingford Accessible Boat Club.

The package of improvements has been designed to be step-free to provide easy access to people of all disabilities and to enhance the whole riverside as an attractive destination for residents, visitors, clubs and river users alike.

Work has covered improvements to the existing access path, roadway, ramp and moorings at the riverside – in addition to the installation of an accessible pontoon designed for river lovers with a disability.

Whilst the facility is available to all, it has been specifically designed to meet the requirements of the Wallingford Accessible Boat Club's wheelyboat, WOW-one, to enable disabled and less mobile people to have equal access to the river. To support the Wallingford Accessible Boat Club's activities, the site includes a wheelchair accessible cabin with access to water and electricity. The ambition is to create cheerful artwork on the cabin to brighten up the area.

In a related project, a Changing Places accessible bathroom has also been created at the riverside, next to the existing toilet facilities and is now available for use.

The completion of the work times perfectly with the summer opening of the Riverside site. The popular campsite opened at the beginning of May and the outdoor pool and splash pad will follow later this month.

Cllr James-Lawrie, South Oxfordshire District Council's Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "This May we are celebrating the opening of the new accessible moorings and all the related improvements at the Riverside. Alongside the moorings and better path access, I'm delighted we've been able to include a Changing Places at this site.

"We've already put significant funding in recent years into the campsite, pool, toilet and wash facilities and a fabulous makeover of our splash pads – which proved incredibly popular the last two seasons.

"Our latest improvements further enhance the location as a 'destination' within the district. I'm also pleased we are in a position to make the facilities more accessible so that everyone can benefit from our beautiful riverside."

John Jenkins MBE, Chairman of Wallingford Accessible Boat Club, commented: "This is a truly wonderful moment for our club — an historic occasion! The facilities at Riverside complete with adjoining car parking, easy access down to the water and to our wheelyboat, WOW-one, will enable us to offer more river trips to more disabled and elderly people so that they can enjoy the wonders of the river just as able-bodied people do.

"We have been working with South Oxfordshire District Council on this project for almost 5 years and we are very thankful to the Council for the project funding and to the councillors and officers who got behind us to drive it to a successful conclusion. I really hope the combination of our wheelyboat service and this superb facility will help attract visitors to Wallingford, to underline it as the river town it truly is."

Cllr Andrea Powell, Ward Councillor for Benson and Crowmarsh, said: "This is fantastic news for Wallingford, Crowmarsh and our local communities and visitors. We are delighted this much anticipated project has finally come to fruition. It is the result of lots of hard work not only by the district council, but from the efforts of ward councillors, parish councillors, the town council, Wallingford Accessible Boat Club and the local community, all working together for these improvements to happen."

An experienced civil engineering firm, Greenford Ltd, who are based in Wheatley, completed the work on behalf of the council.

The project has been financed by £209,534 of CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) money, charged by South Oxfordshire District Council on new development in the district. This refurbishment work follows a £400,000 boost of the onsite wash facilities and a revamp of the splashpads in 2023.

<u>Riverside Park and Pool</u> are run by GLL on behalf of the council, whilst South Oxfordshire District Council owns and manages the park and moorings at this site.




